This communication is intended for all school administrators, professional and service employees, and is public to any stakeholders, including families and community members. The update is to provide current information regarding district news and operations, and matters requiring attention by our schools.

A Message from Superintendent Branch

The 2021-2022 school year is drawing to a close. This year has been one of challenges, as our teachers have worked diligently to address the learning loss from the pandemic remote learning. Our students had to reacclimate to learning in the actual classroom, and our service staff continued to valiantly respond to the needs of all in our learning communities. Our families also need to be commended for their partnership, which is essential to providing guidance and quality education for our learners.

Another important area of focus has been the social-emotional and mental wellness of our students and staff. The long months of quarantines and remote learning stressed the personal connections we may have taken for granted before COVID. Some have experienced loss on a much greater scale. All of this affects how we interact with one another and how we respond to our own experiences. Our partnering behavioral and mental health providers, as well as our administrators, counselors, teachers, and other staff, provided supports to our learning family and found that creating a supportive environment meant it was necessary to more deeply understand how our students have been affected by these past two years. Our recent school climate survey gave students, staff, and families an opportunity to communicate how they felt about a variety of factors that affect the well-being of all members of our learning family. This input will directly affect strategic changes to improve safety and the overall school environment.

Normalcy is what we all wish we could get back to. We had no control over the arrival of the virus and no choice other than to learn how to strive and survive. Now, it is most important that we emerge as a learning community that is focused on making school work best for the success of our students. This means providing effective support for our staff, developing prioritized standards-based curriculum, implementing research-based practices, and providing instruction that is centered on the learner and their unique needs. We must also provide other opportunities for growth and creativity and welcome families back into our schools.

As we reflect on the past year and look forward to the next, I wish to express gratitude to the members of the Board of Education for leadership in a difficult time, and acknowledgement to the district office staff and school administrators for their commitment to making school work, under the most trying of circumstances. I wish to express admiration for our professional staff for their dedication to the success of our students, and thank our service staff for going above and beyond. I also want to provide assurance to our students and families that we will do everything possible to give them schools they can be proud of.

Spotlight on Success



Early College Academy

Twelve Students from Mingo Central and Tug Valley High Schools completed the first cohort year of the Mingo Early College Academy, a collaboration between Southern WV Community and Technical College and the Mingo County School District. Students who complete two years in ECA have an opportunity to earn an associate's degree in University Transfer, or general studies courses. Students attend classes on the Williamson campus of SWVCTC Monday through Thursday mornings and return to their high schools for more course work. This spring, two Tug Valley students, Cassidy Griffey and Ethan Colegrove, each earned two associate degrees before walking across their high school graduation stage. The cohort for next school year has grown to more than 20 students, with some of those students enrolled in the Mingo County pilot program of "Grow Your Own", a teacher preparatory program designed to return students to Mingo County as teachers, within two to three years of graduating high school.

For Our Employees

Certificate Renewal

All teachers who need to renew their teaching certificate or permit need to do so by the end of June 2022. If a teacher has not already renewed or talked with HR about their options, they need to complete the proper renewal application or contact HR as soon as possible. WV State Law prohibits counties from employing teachers who are not properly certified or permitted.

Coaches AED/CPR Training

All coaches, whether professional (teachers) or citizen coaches, are required to have current AED/CPR training. Tonya Hagy will be providing the training for the 2022-2023 school year. The schedule is as follows: 6/6/22 10 a.m. at District Office in the First Floor Conference Room; 6/8/22 1 p.m. in the Media Center at Mingo Central High School; 6/10/22 at 10 a.m. in the auditorium at Tug Valley High

School. Citizen coaches will not be able to renew their temporary coaching authorization without the required trainings. Coaches need to apply for their renewals now in order to be eligible for flex days and practices after July 1, 2022. No coaches are permitted to do any coaching without being fully certified. School Health Services

New Policy for Administration of Opioid Antagonist

The Mingo County Board of Education recently adopted a policy to stock Naloxone, an emergency medication used to reverse symptoms of opioid overdose, at schools in our district. In an effort to

promote wellness and be prepared for emergencies, our board members voted unanimously to provide this service to our students and staff. Mingo County School District will partner with the Mingo County Health Department to receive Naloxone free of charge. School nurses and other staff will be trained in the procedure for use and safe storage.
